


## CARE FOR OUR EARTH

Sr. Philomena Bowers (Congregational Leader of the Union of the Sisters of Mercy) addressed both groups. 'Care for Our Common Home' was the theme, and as she spoke she inspired us to think and reflect anew on how we can work in partnership, and individually, caring for every aspect of Creation.



She reminded us of the beauty and complexity of the earth we share, and through thought-provoking slides, powerfully, that the greatest natural resource is the Human Person. 'Laudato Si' (Encyclical of Pope Francis) was brought to life for us. The Pope encourages us to have a profound

love for all of Creation in all its facets. He challenges us to reflect on how we personally use, and are responsible for the resources at our disposal.

When it comes to technology we were challenged on how we would exist without our mobile phones! But our preference for real cards over E-cards was overwhelming!

We were reminded of the destruction that does happen in our world, and perhaps tempted to be down-hearted about it.
